



Build Up, Branch Out is a two-year generosity initiative of Trinity Lutheran Church & Schools to fund delayed and much-needed roof and building repairs, and grow the Mission Budget Funding* to foster a sustainable future of lived generosity for TLCS as a partner in the Lynnwood community—and beyond!



This initiative, and its two components, directly align with our shared vision and values, and will allow us to branch out into God's preferred future for the people and ministries of TLCS.

Build Up for the Community...

The TLCS building itself is an instrument used to proclaim in word and in action the good news of reconciliation, beauty, justice, and wholeness to all people. God has entrusted it to us so that it can be a beacon of life and hope in the community. We must respond in kind to this calling by maintaining this 27-year-old facility and ensuring it is safe and secure for many years to come.

The Lynnwood community is expected to grow and change dramatically over the next several years, and Trinity is poised at the crossroads—the busiest intersection in Snohomish County—in close proximity to transit, with new housing developments popping up all around us every day. Now is the time to grow and strengthen our Mission Budget Funding ("General Fund") through sustainable generosity in order to serve this growing population—both as a spiritual home and through high-quality child education and care.

...Branch Out into the Community

Build Up for the Next Generation...

For over 80 years, Trinity has emphasized the importance of building a strong foundation of Christian education for the next generations, at times welcoming over 1000 children served by 125 teachers! This commitment to children was also seen with the opening of Trinity Preschool in 1980 and the Child Development Center in 1995, which serve hundreds of children in the community each year, providing safe, welcoming, and Christ-inspired education and childcare.

By addressing and funding much-needed roof and building repairs, we can confidently provide a safe space for another 80+ years of quality spiritual and educational opportunities for the ever-changing needs of the Lynnwood community. With our commitment to grow the TLCS Mission Budget Funding—and foster a culture of sustainable and lived generosity—we can equip TLCS staff and leadership with the resources and security to branch out to the next generation.

...Branch Out to the Next Generation

Build Up in Christ...

Christ is at the heart of all we do at TLCS: in worship, prayer, study, learning, and service. But in order to faithfully "live our lives in Christ," we must build up both our physical space—through roof and building repairs—and our Mission Budget Funding—through a culture of sustained generosity.

As a result of this shared challenge, we will be able to confidently respond to Christ's calling to "go and make disciples" (Matthew 28:19), branching out from this space into the wider community, responding and adapting to its ever-changing needs.

Primary Goal 100% Prayerful Engagement

Everyone who considers TLCS their church home is asked to engage with this initiative by joining together to pray, commit, grow, and give generously.

Secondary Goal \$4.2 Million


- → Roof & Building Repairs = \$1.7 Million
- → Mission Budget Funding (2 Years) = \$2.5 Million

Mission Budget Funding is Trinity's 'General Fund,' and the goal represents a modest increase in projected giving for both 2023 & 2024, which will allow us to invest more in ministries that touch the heart of God and impact the community.

Giving Initiative Total = \$4.2 Million

Benevolence Increase

Trinity currently sends 6% of its annual income to the Northwest Washington Synod as Mission Support. The ELCA recommends that congregations 'tithe' or give 10% away as benevolence. Over the next two years, as part of this initiative, council and leadership propose to increase that Synod Mission Support by 1% each year, and provide an additional 1% in 2023 and 2% in 2024 to support one or more local organizations. By fostering a culture of sustainable generosity at Trinity, we'll be able to reach that goal of 10% benevolent giving, embodying God's calling to live generously.



How Will You Respond?

1. Pray

that God will multiply our efforts to live out our generosity such that we meet our goal for roof and building repairs and expanded Mission Budget Funding.

2. Commit

to taking steps forward in your generosity and contributing to the goal of 100% prayerful engagement in the Build Up, Branch Out initiative.

3. Grow

by participating in the Build Up, Branch Out **worship series**—October 2, 9, 16, 23, 30—and setting aside time each day to follow the **daily devotions** found in later pages.

4. Give

in a way that changes you. Every person who calls TLCS home is asked to prayerfully make a two year commitment to this initiative and fill out a commitment card between now and October 30.

Lived Generosity

We have all received grace upon grace through God's love in Jesus Christ. "Build Up, Branch Out" invites us all to give in response to God's grace, not out of guilt or compulsion, but as an act of worship and an active part of everyday life. God pours freely into our lives, and invites us to open our hands and hearts, giving freely in ways that both challenge and surprise us. We are generosity lived.

As Jesus tells us in Matthew 10:8 – "Freely you have received; freely give."

And again we are reminded in 1 Peter 4:10 – "Each of you should use whatever gift you have received to serve others, as faithful stewards of God's grace in its various forms."

While our faith challenges us to give freely, we live in a culture that teaches us to grip tightly to our possessions. Giving as an act of worship often invites us to give up something in one area so we can give more of ourselves in another area, and leads to a life of generosity lived.



Creative Ways to Grow in Your Generosity

Many of God's people have been amazed at their ability to give more generously to their church than they ever imagined. The following steps may help you do this:

Practice Priority Budgeting

Consider rearranging priorities to give up something in your current budget in order to give more to God's work in this campaign. What could you sacrifice to free up resources to Build Up and Branch Out?

Redirect Present Expenditures

Often people have significant short-term expenditures for special needs. Perhaps you will finish paying off a college loan halfway through next year, or finish making car or home loan payments. Could you redirect these funds to God's mission at TLCS?

Increased Giving with Increased Income

Some people receive periodic increases in salary or bonuses. The temptation for many of us is to increase our lifestyle to fit the higher income. Consider instead committing the full amount of salary increases to God's purposes through the Build Up, Branch Out initiative.

Give Creatively from Stored Resources

A young man decided that two collectors' baseball cards worth over \$20,000 he had been holding for a number of years would be an appropriate and meaningful sacrifice. Some families save money over a period of years for a special project. One couple had saved \$80,000 to build a lake cabin; when their church entered a generosity initiative, they decided the needs of the church were greater than their need for a second home.

Commit Unexpected Cash

Often people pray for God to show them a way they can give beyond what they can presently see or afford. Sometimes the answers come unexpectedly. A couple had been praying for weeks about their commitment to their church's campaign. Much to their surprise, they received an inheritance of several thousand dollars. They gave the entire amount to their church as part of their commitment.

Sacrifice Extra Time

Some people have extra time they can use in a part-time job to be able to give more to the church. One individual decided to put off retirement by one year so that he could give the extra year of income to his church for their campaign.

Donate Appreciated Assets

Gifts of appreciated assets (often investment securities or real estate) can be very advantageous to both the giver and the church.

Frequently Asked Questions

What is "Build Up, Branch Out: Generosity Lived"?

A two-year generosity initiative of Trinity Lutheran Church & Schools to fund delayed and muchneeded roof and building repairs, and grow the Mission Budget Funding ("General Fund") to foster a sustainable future of lived generosity for TLCS as a partner in the Lynnwood community—and beyond!

What are the financial goals for this initiative?

Our campaign goal is \$4,200,000 and consists of \$1.7M in roof/building repairs and \$2.5M in Mission Budget Funding (the "general" or "operating" fund) for two years.

What is the timeline for "Build Up, Branch Out?" What are the key dates?

The initiative kicks off on Sunday, October 2, 2022 and continues each Sunday in October. It culminates on Commitment Sunday on October 30, as we celebrate the Reformation and our Lutheran Heritage.

What if I need to adjust my commitment in the future due to unforeseen circumstances?

You may adjust your contribution level at any time by contacting our Administrator, Don Boelter.

Why are we using Commitment Cards—can't this be just between "me and God"?

We make promises when something matters deeply to us. We sign contracts for cell phones, lease agreements, and marriage certificates as a way of stating our intentions. Commitment Cards also help our church leaders to plan wisely and well. Together let's make commitments to what God will do in and through Trinity Lutheran Church & Schools in 2023-2024.



How do I make my commitment? Is it confidential?

You will be given a Commitment Card on which you can indicate your intent for giving. Your card will be kept confidential (an envelope will be provided to ensure so) and collected during the initiative.

How long will I have to fulfill my commitment? When do I start giving?

"Build Up, Branch Out" is a two-year initiative. Giving toward your commitment begins in November 2022 and extends through December 2024, though you can always begin giving at your new level anytime!


Why is TLCS engaging in a major capital and mission funding campaign at this time?

Because we believe God has a strong and clear call for TLCS to lead and serve in our community, responding and adapting to the rapid change, past, present and future. The need is great! We believe this goal is achievable for the people of TLCS and have engaged outside counsel to help us wisely discern our goal. The people of TLCS has always responded generously when asked–let's continue to do so now.

In these uncertain times, I don't feel comfortable giving money away—wouldn't it be better to save my money in case I need it?

Scripture tells us God has given us life, our abilities and personality traits, and, sometimes through inheritance, sometimes through using those gifts God has given us, we are able to earn money. Yet, Jesus taught that what we have is not our own. It still belongs to God. We've simply been entrusted with oversight of it, and to use it in ways that will delight and serve God. The Bible's starting place for doing this is to see 90% of what's in our possession as ours to live with, and then return 10% to God, by giving it to places and partners who help bring God's kingdom. This ends up being pretty amazingly joyful and rewarding! We can make such a difference, in ways we never ever imagined.





Focus on the Word

Devotions for our Stewardship Journey

Stewardship is a way of life that reflects who we are, and whose we are. We are called to live generous lives.

Throughout this booklet you have learned about Trinity Lutheran Church & School's journey in striving to be faithful stewards of all that belongs to God.

Jesus sent the Holy Spirit to guide, inspire, and support us in listening to the Lord's teachings, which come to us through the Scriptures, people, and all of creation.

This devotional is a guide for us to journey together, as the Spirit builds the church up and nurtures us to branch out, bearing fruit that blesses us and all people. It is also a reminder that worship is a way of life and a daily practice, because we are church everyday and anywhere.

You will notice that each day in a week has an emphasis. On Sunday we will ponder the Gospel reading assigned for that day. On Mondays, we will dig deeper in the word by reflecting on a different reading assigned for the previous Sunday. On Tuesdays, we will take action by practicing generosity. On Wednesday, as you continue to practice, you can read some inspirational poems. Thursday, you can sing, as music is a way to praise and worship. On Fridays, you will pause to reflect. And finally on Saturday, you will practice Sabbath and pray.

Notice that there are activities and resources for your children as you cultivate generosity in their lives. Our baptismal vows include cultivating the faith in our children. This is an opportunity to do it.

As we reflect, pray, and practice—united in the Spirit—we remember that all that we are and all that we have comes from God by Grace through the Lord Jesus Christ. Our lives are an act of worship, an expression of faith, and a spiritual discipline.

Generosity lived is our duty and our delight expressed by faithful living, faithful giving, and sacrificial service.

May the Spirit guide us through this month.

Daily Devotions

Sunday, October 2 (Ponder) - Read Luke 17:5-10

Jesus is teaching the disciples about forgiving seven times a day. The apostles respond by saying to the Lord, "increase our faith." It seems that it is not about increasing the size or amount of faith. It is about practicing the faith that is already given. Even a "small" faith can do great things. So, it is about practicing it. We are called to do what we ought to do. That is to practice trust in God, and live out the freedom that is already given to us. We can forgive, let go, move on and forward. Faith moves us to open our hands to receive and release, trusting that what gives meaning to our lives is already given to us. We are free!

- → What makes us think that we do not have enough faith? Why?
- *→ How do you live your faith?*

The Marvelous Mustard Seed by Amy-Jill Levine (Ages 4-8) & A Kids Guide to Giving by Freddi Zeiler

Monday, October 3 (Go Deeper) - Read Lamentations 3:19-26

This passage in many ways portrays the bleak reality around us. The writer believes that God's glory, all that he/she had hoped for from the Lord, is gone! Yet, the writer comes to the conclusion that he/she has his/her portion (v.24) - the Lord! The steadfast love of the Lord never ceases, and his mercies never come to an end (v. 22).

- → In which ways does this passage speak to you and to our current situation?
- → What do you call to mind when what you hope for from the Lord is gone?
- → How do you experience God's steadfast love and mercies? How do you share them with others?
- → What does God's steadfast love free us from?
- → How do you see yourself living in the freedom of God's steadfast love?

Tuesday, October 4 (Practice) - Read Matthew 6:24-25

- → Make a list of those things or persons that may be holding you hostage.
- → Make a list of people or anything in your life that assures you that you are free and made whole.
- → Identify a person around you who you can pray for or visit with to encourage with words of hope and actions that bring life.
 Intentionally set apart time to accompany the person.
- → Write a reflection of how God's steadfast love touched you and that person.

Daily Devotions

Sunday, October 9 (Ponder) - Read Luke 17:11-19

Compared to many other cultures, Americans say "thank you" a lot. Parents often drill it into their children at a young age: "What do you say?" Throughout the day, we say "thank you" for everything from getting our coffee from a barista to the person who held a door open for us; and we hear it from cashiers, loved ones, even receipts from online purchases.

In today's story, Jesus heals ten lepers, but only one of them made the effort to say "thank you" to God-in an all-consuming way, no less. And the narrator is sure to point out that this individual is none other than a Samaritan, a person identified as a "foreigner" (aka someone unexpected).

- → When you give thanks, what is the meaning and purpose behind it?
 Is it out of habit ("what do you say?") or does it stem from something else?
- → How is God calling you to give thanks in a radical, all-consuming way like the foreigner in today's story?

Monday, October 10 (Go Deeper) - Read 2 Timothy 2:8-15

Paul reminds us, "If we have died with Christ, we will also live with Christ."

When we give thanks, God isn't asking us to dismiss or deny the struggles we face on earth. Our baptisms serve as a reminder that God meets us in our pain, as well as our imperfections, and brings us into new life in His glory. When we give thanks for what God has given us, we also give thanks for the freedom we have in Christ from the things that would otherwise enslave and entangle us.

- → What pain or struggle can you give to God, so that you may be free to offer God thanks and praise?
- → How can God's baptismal promises call us deeper into lived generosity?

Tuesday, October 11 (Practice) - Read Luke 21:1-4

- → What does your "all" look like?
- → Take a few minutes every day to reflect on what you consider gives your life true meaning. Make a list.
- → Consider gradually increasing your giving to God's mission though TLCS. You can lay out a plan.
- \rightarrow We pray... Today I ask God to give me the courage to name my "all" and hold nothing back from God's control in my life.

Saturday, October 15 (Pray)

Daily Devotions

Sunday, October 16 (Ponder) - Read Luke 11:5-8 & Luke 18:1-8

→ What similarities or common themes do you find in these passages?

Perseverance may not only mean that we keep trying and hoping for the best results. It demands vulnerability and trust. But what does it mean to trust when facing adversities?

→ What thoughts or feelings come to you when you hear the words "pray always and do not lose heart"?

Jesus uses the parable to affirm people that God will grant justice to those who cry to God day and night. It is God who grants justice. The context of the story is Jesus foretelling people about his passion and death, which could be a reason for people to lose heart and perhaps quit praying. Jesus challenges us to pray and act to shift from a scarcity mindset, to an abundance and trust mindset.

- → What is the connection between justice and prayer?
- → What action in our daily life, individually and as a congregation, will reflect God's generosity?
- → How do you think that prayer and generous living help you to grow deeper in your faith to trust in God's promise?

Monday, October 17 (Go Deeper) - Read Psalm 121

This Psalm reflects the prayer of a person who is on a pilgrimage to Jerusalem.

The Psalmist expresses trust and confidence in God's providence, but also recognizes that hardship and discouragement will be part of life and the faith journey.

The prayer reminds us that the Lord God is our keeper. As we enter this journey of discernment and recommitment to a generous life we are exhorted to remember where we find the strength and abundance that creates in us trust and confidence in God from whom our help comes.

- → What is discouraging you or challenging you in your life and faith journey?
- → How do you think that God our keeper will accompany and keep you and the congregation?
- → Trusting that God will provide and keep us, what will you be praying/asking God to change your heart and actions to make generosity a way of life that brings blessing to all people through the ministry of TLCS?

Tuesday, October 18 (Practice) - Read Genesis 12:1-8

Abraham is a good example of living a generous way of life.

- → Include in your daily prayers for God to grant you a heart that trusts God above everything else.
- → Reflect on the times when God has met your needs in surprising and amazing ways. Write them down and share them with someone as a testimony to God's faithful provision.
- → We pray... Today I ask God to help me give up control and begin to trust Him to be my provider.

Monday, October 24 (Go Deeper) - Read 2 Timothy 4:6-8, 16-18

→ What themes do you hear in this verse?

At first, it may seem as if Paul is himself quite prideful; but he does indeed give thanks and glory to God for staying at his side and giving him the strength of perseverance. What may sound like pride could be interpreted as confidence in the Lord. Ultimately, Paul's message reminds his audience that followers of Christ are never left alone, but accompanied by the One who is and always will be at our side.

- → What do you make of the image of being "poured out like a drink offering" as Paul nears the end of his life?
- → How might we consider our own lives and what we have as something to "pour out"?

Tuesday, October 25 (Practice) - Read Isaiah 58:6-7

- → How can generosity bring joy and fun to our lives? Maybe we are to ride the generosity roller coaster.
- → Pray for a new vision for your generosity. Hear from God. Pray with an open heart that God will lead you in one specific area of generosity. Perhaps God has had it in your heart for a while and now is the time to step out in faith.
- → Write down the visions that God has placed in your heart and identify one of them to put it into practice.

Now that your child has seen you, helped you, and done it with your help, allow your child to do it by him/herself. Consider talking about other ways to generously give to God their time and talent.

Wednesday, October 26 - "Wrestling at Peniel" by Alyssa Underwood

It's at the point of desperation that the soul finds its deepest desire, and in that desire lies everything of which true life is made. Perhaps the first and central question concerning surrender ought not to be, "What am I willing to give to God?" but "What am I willing to receive from Him?"

For it's only in the realization that I have nothing to give Him and He has everything to give me that true humility and surrender come. (Ponder) - Read Luke 19:1-10

We read in Ecclesiastes 5:10 that "who-ever loves money never has enough; who-ever loves wealth is never satisfied with their income." Secular science supports this reality.

The late writer Mark Fisher termed the phrase depressive hedonia, which he describes as "an inability to do anything else except pursue pleasure. There is a sense that 'something is missing'—but no appreciation that this mysterious, missing enjoyment can only be accessed beyond the pleasure principle." A love of money and the act of hoarding as much of it for ourselves as possible shackles us to this futile pursuit.

On the other hand, research is showing that when people **give generously**, parts of the midbrain are activated—the same parts associated with processing rewards and thus releasing dopamine, the "happy" chemical. **Humans are, indeed, wired for generosity**.

For all those with the ability and means to give, whether little or much, generosity is the way to "take hold of the life that is truly life." In opening our hands to give, we **open our hands to receive**. We relinquish greed and scarcity and in return receive freedom and life. Generosity is liberation.

- → What might have led Zacchaeous to accumulate more than what he needed?
- → What do you think that happened during the meal with Jesus?
- → What was he liberated or set free from?
- → How is the Lord calling you to practice "Generosity lived" and experience the liberation?
